Dear Parents and Carers,

When seeking feedback at the last P&C meeting I discovered that some parents are experiencing problems accessing the new Parent Portal. We have since identified that at least one of the problems is related to the *Sentral for Parents* mobile app which has not yet been rolled out. However, by the end ot term three, all ACT public schools **will** have access to the app. If you are experiencing any other problem with the Parent Portal, please contact Jo Hastings in the front office. She has helped quite a few portal users already so can often answer your questions quickly. If not, she will contact the technical team and get back to you as soon as possible.

Parents have also provided feedback on the number of times families have been asked to fill out medical forms for camps and excursions this year. This is certainly something that we will endeavour to streamline because we know it is incredibly frustrating to be asked to fill out the same information over and over again. As a general rule parents and carers should only need to fill out medical forms for the first excursion of each year. If you have updated your child's medical details during the calendar year you do not need to fill out another medical form. The exceptions are that:

- your child's health needs have changed, and/or
- your child is attending an aquatic activity e.g., swimming carnival or school camp (because of the Education Directorate policies related to these events).

When we rolled out Toddle this year to replace Seesaw, we did not open the parent comment feature because teachers are unable to monitor posts. Parents have let us know that they miss this interactive feature, so we intend opening up Toddle for parent and carer comments from the start of next term. Please remember to only use the Toddle comment feature to celebrate your children's achievements and contribute to reflection on their learning goals. If you have a concern or question or you need to explain an absence, please use the Sentral Parent Portal or email the front office or relevant teacher.

Parents and carers are welcome to attend the carnival and we very much hope you will join us at the Book Week Fair and morning tea. This Term

The last few weeks were very busy with increasing staffing shortages caused by winter illnesses and teachers writing end of semester reports. We also received a sudden announcement that both of our preschools were to be visited for reassessment. Red Hill Preschool was assessed two weeks ago, and Griffith Preschool this week. The visits involved the assessor observing four days of practice in classrooms and interviewing all key staff. We were also required to collate evidence to demonstrate achievement of the seven quality areas of the National Quality Standards for Early Childhood Settings.

A few weeks ago, we also had an external EDU school improvement panel visit our classrooms during maths teaching time. We received glowing feedback about the pedagogical approaches that teachers were using in classrooms and the high levels of student engagement in every classroom. The visitors were also impressed by:

• students' ability to speak about their learning (making links to learning intentions, success criteria & units of inquiry),

• students' use of mathematical language, and the ways in which they could verbalise their mathematical thinking and the strategies that they use,

• the learning that was visible on classroom walls,

• teachers' collaboration to plan learning experiences and link the program of inquiry to the new Australian mathematics curriculum,

• teachers' efforts to creatively engage students in mathematical concepts and show their own engagement in mathematics,

- intentional teaching and explicit lessons,
- teachers actively identifying areas of practice to improve on and using peer coaching to support this, and
- the leadership commitment to supporting this work and being instructional leaders.

Whilst improvement of numeracy learning outcomes is a strategic priority, it is always important that we pay attention to literacy. Over the last twelve months we have been ensuring that the changes in the Australian Curriculum for English are being implemented in classrooms. One school action has been the increased use of decodable 'readers' for the early childhood years, which previously had only been used in our intervention program. We committed \$10,000 this year to purchase more 'decodables' for the junior school which are being used in the classroom and at home. We have almost completed this procurement project.

I will write more about literacy in the next newsletter, in light of the recent Literacy and Numeracy Report recommendations.

I would also like to let you know that we have just sadly farewelled Sam Harris. Sam has won a twelve month executive teacher role at Gordon Primary and will be replaced by Angus Middleton on 4H.

In closing I wish you all well over the winter holiday break and thank you for working with the staff to support our students.

Dear parents and carers,

As the term and the semester comes to a close, I would like to express my thanks to our wonderful staff that support your children every day, not only by looking after their academic needs, but more importantly helping them to become independent, caring young people who can make a difference in the world. How is this possible you might ask? Through the amazing IB Primary Years Program (PYP) that your children are exposed to every minute that they are at school. We are proud of the difference that this program makes in the lives of our students, and I would like to give you a small insight into what your children have accomplished this semester.

Throughout the semester, we have investigated many units of inquiry in each grade level, helping your children build knowledge, skills and conceptual understanding about a huge variety of real world issues. Preschool and

kindergarten have explored how important it is to build relationships with others, how to be good friends and how sharing simple interests can help us connect and develop new relationships. All of this taking place through exploratory play, where there are many connections to be made.

Year 1, amongst other units, have been out in the school environment developing their scientific skills of prediction, observation and drawing conclusions by looking at how seasonal changes impact the playground.

Year 2 have investigated the many ways that people can learn, plunging themselves into the 'Learning Pit' and coming up out of the pit smarter and more able to problem solve.

Year 3 have become wellbeing experts, while investigating how our bodies and minds are affected by healthy food, sleep, movement and hydration.

Year 4 now know what governance is and how it applies to many different forms of government around the world and they understand that a democracy can also look different to ours.

Year 5 have delved into how our bodies change and grow throughout our lives and that these processes are natural and part of the human experience.

Year 6 have become budding scientists, developing their understanding of the many forms of science that exist.

"Could our children possibly be learning these things at a level that they truly understand?", you might ask. My answer would be "Absolutely!" The PYP expects nothing less from our students. If you would like to know more about what your children have discovered, learnt and taken action on, ask them.

You will see some of this learning reflected in the reports that were emailed home yesterday. Please take the time to ask your children about what they enjoyed most about learning this term, while celebrating them as learners. What they tell you might surprise you.

It is a pleasure and a privilege to be working at Red Hill where the expectations are high and the students' ability to reach these are higher. I look forward to helping our collaborative planning teams design and implement more rich learning experiences next term.

Wish list items	Examples of items we are unable to accept

It is a cashless online ordering system which streamlines payment, ordering and processing of purchases and events. Quick and easy, it can be accessed 24/7 on PC, Mac, or mobile app.

School uniform orders for existing students will be delivered to your child's classroom. Otherwise, orders can be collected from the front office.
